

25 YEARS LATER, FUND HONORING STEFANIE SPIELMAN FUELS ADVANCEMENTS IN BREAST CANCER RESEARCH

\$26 MILLION IN DONATIONS — AND COUNTING — HONORS STEFANIE'S LEGACY

When Stefanie Spielman was diagnosed with breast cancer in 1998, she and her husband Chris, a former Ohio State and professional football standout, established the Stefanie Spielman Fund for Breast Cancer Research at The Ohio State University Comprehensive Cancer Center – Arthur G. James Cancer Hospital and Richard J. Solove Research Institute (OSUCCC – James).

Their goal was to raise \$250,000. Thanks to generous donors who share the Spielman family's commitment to advancing research, the fund has now impressively raised more than \$26 million.

Stefanie was “determined to find the good in something bad.” The “good,” she explained, was the love and support she received from the community, the everyday blessings she did not take for granted, and the tremendous impact of the Spielman Fund in helping multitudes of patients and their families.

An outpouring of support from the breast cancer community

The overwhelming success of the Spielman Fund comes as no surprise to those who remember Stefanie's cheerful and inspirational persona.

“Am I astonished? No. Impressed and grateful? Absolutely,” says David E. Cohn, MD, MBA, interim CEO and chief medical officer of the OSUCCC – James. “The Spielman family, their friends and supporters, and the entire community have done a remarkable job of recognizing what was important to Stefanie.”

William Farrar, MD, also expressed his lack of surprise by the success of the fund. Dr. Farrar is a retired surgical oncologist who first diagnosed Stefanie in his breast cancer clinic at the OSUCCC – James. He helped her and Chris determine a treatment plan, performed her initial surgery and assisted with her treatment.

“Stefanie and Chris had a very difficult time dealing with her diagnosis,” Dr. Farrar recalls, “but they developed a plan to help them win this battle by leveraging their Christian faith and

Chris' notoriety as a former Ohio State athlete. They quickly realized that her diagnosis provided a forum for reaching thousands of patients who also needed support.”

Jennifer McDonald, an assistant vice president of development who leads fundraising efforts for the OSUCCC – James, believes Stefanie and Chris “were surprised and thrilled by the outpouring of support from the community as they quickly surpassed their original funding goal.”

“Stefanie was so present with the fund; she truly saw it as an opportunity to give back and make a difference,” McDonald explains. “Her presence and that of her entire family are what really helped the fund grow. If she could attend a fundraising event, she was there, and often her children were with her.”

Spielman family continues Stefanie's work

Maddie Spielman, the eldest of the Spielman children, attributes the enduring success of the fund to “the power

and achievements as the Spielman Patient Assistance Fund, which provides educational and support programs for breast cancer patients, caregivers and families. The Spielman Breast Cancer Tissue Cohort and Tissue Bank provides a repository of samples for research and significant investments in technology to accelerate breast cancer studies and patient care.


Establishing a lasting legacy for breast cancer patients

On Oct. 24, 2011, Ohio State further honored Stefanie's memory by renaming the newly opened JamesCare Comprehensive Breast Center as the Stefanie Spielman Comprehensive Breast Center (SSCBC). The center offers a full spectrum of care, providing patients access to innovative imaging, treatments, support services, clinical trials, reconstructive surgery and counseling.

Roman Skoracki, MD, an oncologic plastic surgeon and director of the SSCBC, believes support from the Spielman

of my mom. She made everyone feel as if they were her best friend.”

Maddie is currently an assistant director for leadership annual giving at The Ohio State University Alumni Association, and her work focuses on the OSUCCC – James.

“I cover multiple cancer areas, including breast cancer, meaning I can work directly with Spielman Fund donors and their families,” she says. “I'm awed whenever someone wants to give back despite going through unimaginable circumstances.”

Putting philanthropy to work for patients

“Every dollar donated to the Spielman Fund supports research, technology or patient care,” McDonald says. “That was an important decision by Stefanie and Chris. They wanted to ensure that charitable dollars would have full impact without the overhead of running a nonprofit.”

The Spielman Fund comprises several sub-funds, including some that can be tapped to make an immediate difference. Collectively, these monies have led to such innovations

Fund has informed the OSUCCC – James' vision for the breast center, which was the first of its kind in the Midwest.

“The vision at the inception of the breast center, together with the vision of many community leaders, donors and the Spielman family, has enabled us to build this model in which everyone is under one roof, facilitating greater communication and collaboration,” Dr. Skoracki says. “It also means there's a sense of family, which includes patients, their loved ones and those providing care. This focus on family permeates everything we do.”

The sense of family aligns with the Spielmans' determination to help the OSUCCC – James and the community follow Stefanie's often-quoted reminder to “continue to fight, continue to live.”

“We've made great strides; There are treatments today that didn't exist 25 years ago,” McDonald says. “However, we still lose loved ones to breast cancer. For me, that's motivation enough to keep fundraising and investing in research initiatives that lead to better therapies and quality of life for our patients.”

Milestones

For 25 years, the Stefanie Spielman Fund for Breast Cancer Research has raised money in support of cancer research and patient care.

Here are significant milestones made possible through the generous support of our donors, the community and the Spielman family.



1998

BIG BEAR PARTNERSHIP

After publicly announcing Stefanie Spielman had breast cancer in 1998, the family partnered with Big Bear, a local supermarket, and asked shoppers to purchase paper footballs to be displayed in the store. The goal was to raise \$250,000 and donate all the proceeds to The Ohio State University Comprehensive Cancer Center – Arthur G. James Cancer Hospital and Richard J. Solove Research Institute (OSUCCC – James) for breast cancer research. Within six months, donations from the community totaled \$1 million.

2000

INAUGURAL STEFANIE'S CHAMPIONS AWARD RECIPIENT, CHRIS SPIELMAN

In 2000, the inaugural Stefanie's Champions Luncheon was held to celebrate a cancer survivor's "Champion" — someone who stood by them, provided courage and support through their diagnosis, treatment and care, and who was an inspiration to them through their cancer journey. The Champions Award honored individuals in the lives of cancer survivors who exemplify the qualities and values the Spielman family holds to be important. In 2000, Stefanie gave her husband, Chris, the first award for his unwavering encouragement.



2006

STEFANIE SPIELMAN BREAST CANCER COHORT AND TISSUE BANK OPENS

Since its establishment in 2006, the Stefanie Spielman Breast Cancer Cohort and Tissue Bank has helped generate millions of research dollars for Ohio State. The bank collects donated tissue samples from patients treated for cancer at Ohio State. With thousands of collected samples, the bank is one of the largest and most comprehensive of its kind and has contributed to groundbreaking research.

2007

SPIELMAN COMMUNITY PARTNERS RAISE \$1 MILLION

The Spielman Fund has been championed by the community since its inception through golf outings, bake sales, galas, 5Ks and school fundraisers. By 2007, the combined efforts and generosity from all the community partners events had raised \$1 million for breast cancer research, education and patient care.



2009

DISCOVERY OF CANCER IN STROMAL CELLS

In 2009, a team of researchers at the OSUCCC – James presented one of the first microenvironment-based genetic models on the development of breast cancer. The model utilized their discovery that mutations in stromal cells, which give structure to tissues, are linked to cancer formation. This model, challenging the previous understanding of cancer mutations, was called a "paradigm-shifter."

PATIENT ASSISTANCE FUND STARTED

Knowing the burdens of cancer expanded beyond the physical, in 2009, Chris and Stefanie established the Stefanie Spielman Patient Assistance Fund. For more than a decade, this gift has enabled the OSUCCC – James to hold an annual breast cancer survivorship conference, create "living well with advanced breast cancer" programming, establish support groups and develop educational resources for breast cancer patients, caregivers and families.

2011

STEFANIE SPIELMAN COMPREHENSIVE BREAST CENTER DEDICATION

On Oct. 24, 2011, The Ohio State University dedicated the Comprehensive Breast Center in honor and memory of Stefanie. The center offers the full continuum of breast cancer care, with access to a broad array of breast imaging technologies, diagnostic radiology, clinical trials, chemotherapy, nutrition experts, financial counseling, reconstructive surgery, social work and psychosocial oncology services.






2014

PRONE RADIATION THERAPY TREATMENT IMPLEMENTED

Doctors at the OSUCCC – James developed the first commercially manufactured prone therapy board in 2014. Previously, the boards were handmade. Prone therapy boards allow women to lie on their stomachs during treatment and reduce radiation exposure to the heart and lung tissues. The implementation of prone radiation treatment has led to better outcomes for patients.



2013

MULTIPLE SUBTYPES OF BREAST CANCER DISCOVERED

In 2013, OSUCCC – James researchers and partners in Italy conducted a large-scale study of triple-negative breast cancer and showed that microRNA could be used to define four subtypes of this cancer. This discovery led to new screening methods, prognostic markers and targeted treatments.



2020

STEFANIE SPIELMAN FUND FOR BREAST CANCER RESEARCH REACHES \$25 MILLION

The Spielman Fund marked its 22nd anniversary in 2020 by celebrating \$25 million raised. Meeting this milestone is a reflection of how inspiring Stefanie's legacy is to the thousands of people who work to bolster the fund and her memory. Every dollar raised funds research and ensures the SSCBC continues to offer state-of-the-art equipment for the detection and treatment of breast cancer.

Dr. Roman Skoracki

LOOKS BACK AND AHEAD

Roman Skoracki, MD, became medical director of the Stefanie Spielman Comprehensive Breast Center (SSCBC) at The Ohio State University Comprehensive Cancer Center – Arthur G. James Cancer Hospital and Richard J. Solove Research Institute in 2022.

Dr. Skoracki works with patients from diagnosis through reconstruction and recovery. His research focuses on the long-term impacts of cancer treatments and reconstruction. He also leads the Division of Oncologic Plastic Surgery in the Department of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery at Ohio State's College of Medicine, where he has been on the faculty since 2014.

We recently asked Dr. Skoracki for his thoughts on the history of the SSCBC and its goals for the future.



We are celebrating the Spielman Fund's 25th anniversary. The SSCBC is marking its 12th year; what are its strengths?

One of our greatest strengths is the proximity of our clinical and research specialists, who focus solely on the treatment of breast cancer under one roof. This allows us to have a very organic flow of information and creates an environment where critical questioning is facilitated and strongly encouraged.

The SSCBC has always been a center of excellence in treating patients with breast cancer. We've been able to take it well beyond treatment now. The generosity of our donors has given us access to the latest technology for the diagnosis and treatment of breast cancer and has also supported initiatives that improve the quality of life associated with breast cancer treatment at every level, including long-term survivorship. Philanthropy allows us to invest in leading-edge technology that enhances the standard of care. As a result, we can conduct our own investigator-initiated trials.

We've also become a leader in education thanks to the wealth of multidisciplinary knowledge we've acquired and the willingness of all providers to engage in interdisciplinary work. This is true for our trainees, from medical students to subspecialty fellows, as well as education efforts through outreach into the community.

Breast cancer treatment has changed radically in 25 years, becoming more precise and directed. In the next 25, what evolutions do you anticipate?

I think the trend we've seen with the many new chemotherapeutics and immunotherapies, protocols that either suppress or activate the body's immune

system to treat cancer, coming online will continue. The combinations of how those are used will continue to grow and probably let us continue to de-escalate the surgical intervention, finding the perfect balance between eradicating cancer cells and minimizing the side effects of our therapy, thereby optimizing quality of life.

I think future therapies for breast cancer will provide better control of the disease and higher cure rates than we already have. But most importantly, there will be less disruption to the quality of life of the individual patient. It's my hope that surgery, obviously a drastic experience for anybody, will become increasingly rare and more targeted when necessary. That way, we can have smaller interventions and forgo surgery for many of our patients completely. I am working on my own obsolescence as a surgeon!

How are the research and investigations on breast cancer prevention, detection and treatment happening at the SSCBC leading to the changes we'll see in the next 25 years?

The vision of the OSUCCC – James at the inception of the SSCBC, together with the vision of many community leaders and donors and, of course, the Spielman family, has meant we can

build a unique model where everyone is together, thus facilitating greater communication and collaboration.

It also means there's a sense of family, which includes those caring for our patients, and invariably patients become part of that family as well. This not only flavors the very personal approach to patient care but is something that patients sense and embrace. This focus on family permeates everything that we do. Our solidarity as a team throughout the building means we can connect research, patient care and future innovation. Because they're linked so closely, there's an incredible urgency within us to drive things forward.

As Dr. Skoracki and the SSCBC team collaborate and innovate, care for patients and research developments in cancer prevention, detection and treatment, they are grateful for the support of Spielman Fund donors such as you, who make their work possible.

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TISSUE BANK ADVANCES BREAST CANCER RESEARCH

Since the establishment of the Stefanie Spielman Fund for Breast Cancer Research in 1998, the Spielman family has been clear that they want this philanthropy to not only offer support to patients but radically change how breast cancer is understood.

Among those investments is the Spielman Breast Cancer Cohort and Tissue Bank, established in 2006 to support and promote groundbreaking breast cancer research. Major foundations and government organizations often do not provide financial backing to store tissue samples. Therefore, the Spielman Fund is critical to the formation of a tissue bank and its long-term growth. The work researchers do with the tissue samples leads to opportunities to receive major grant support. Most importantly, their efforts will benefit current and future patients.

“The Spielman Breast Cancer Cohort and Tissue Bank has impacted all phases of cancer care,” says Daniel Stover, MD, associate professor in the Department of Internal Medicine and medical oncology lead for the Spielman Breast Cancer Cohort and Tissue Bank. “For example, research done using samples from the tissue bank is now contributing to our understanding of novel diagnostics like ‘liquid biopsy’ or blood-based tests and digital pathology.”

The bank is also supporting research into the individual expression of the *HER2* gene, which promotes tumor growth, and specific treatments to counteract its expression that scientists at The Ohio State University Comprehensive Cancer Center – Arthur G. James Cancer Hospital and Richard J. Solove Research Institute (OSUCCC – James) are investigating.

The Spielman Breast Cancer Cohort and Tissue Bank has also supported research that has:

- contributed to identifying new risk markers for breast cancer
- increased our understanding of how treatments work in early phases
- deepened our knowledge of how metastatic or advanced breast cancer responds to treatment therapies
- shown the potential side effects of specific treatments and how they might be mitigated

All patients treated for breast cancer at the OSUCCC – James have the opportunity to donate tissue. The bank stores leftover tissue and blood gathered during medical procedures, so patients who consent to participate do not undergo separate procedures. All samples are coded to preserve patient anonymity. Researchers must apply to access samples, and the approval process is designed to foster outcomes of the greatest scientific significance. “These proposals are evaluated for scientific merit — since these are precious samples — but we also try to make access as straightforward as possible to help move research forward,” says Dr. Stover.

Looking toward the future of the Spielman Breast Cancer Cohort and Tissue Bank, Dr. Stover says he and colleagues are continuing to promote revolutionary work.


“We are focusing on expanding areas of particular need and interest for researchers, on breast cancer types that are under-represented in existing studies, and on unique and harder-to-treat subtypes,” he says. “We are making advances that we see as the future of breast cancer care, but also advances that we hadn’t considered before.”

COMMUNITY PARTNER EVENT PLANNING **BEST PRACTICES**

Community Partner donations to The Ohio State University Comprehensive Cancer Center – Arthur G. James Cancer Hospital and Richard J. Solove Research Institute (OSUCCC – James) support patient care, outreach and research.



Organizing a successful Community Partner event can be a challenge, especially the first time. Our Community Partners Team offers tips on what to consider as you plan your event.



First, check the resources on The James Community Partners website (go.osu.edu/JamesCommunityPartners). There you can find information on what Community Partners are, guidelines for planning and executing your event, and resources, including information on how to promote your event.



Next, consider what the centerpiece of your fundraiser will be: a golf scramble, a crafting party, a pickleball tournament, a bake-off, a garden tour, etc. Choose something you enjoy — you'll already have connections in that community you can use, and it will make the planning process more fun.



Brainstorm who will likely support your event, such as family, friends, colleagues or neighbors. What can you do to make it appealing to them? Are there connections you can make between their interests and yours?



Start reaching out for help planning your event. Talk to people about your idea and listen to their reactions and feedback.



Use your network to help contact potential sponsors. Are you a regular at a restaurant? Approach the management with a proposal to back your event in return for publicity.



After your event, exchange high-fives with your co-planners, then start thinking about next year. While your event is fresh in your mind, go over questions such as: What went well? What could use some improvement? Is there something new we would like to try in the future?



If you've been doing an event for a while, it's OK to mix it up if you feel things are getting stale. Keep what's been working and change the rest!

"I've experienced many silver linings since my diagnosis," Brose adds. "Life is short, and I've learned there is much to celebrate after breast cancer."


